- Egypt is a country in the continent of Africa.
- It is home to the largest river in the world!
- The River Nile is approximately 6700km long.
- The River Nile flows into the Mediterranean Sea.
- Most Egyptians live near the River Nile because it provides water, fertile land, and transportation.
- Before the Aswan High Dam was built in 1970, the River Nile used to flood every year.
- 95% of Egypt's population live near the banks of the River Nile as they depend on it for water.
- Nile crocodiles are found in the waters of the River Nile.
- More than 90% of Egypt is dry, sandy desert.
- Tribes and Nomads live in the desert, but they have no land rights so are often moved on by the government or land purchases.
- There are small clusters of oases that are near small water sources - the Siwa oasis provides olive oil. 20,000 people live there!
- In the cities it's very different. There are lots of busy roads full of noisy cars, buses and taxis. New buildings, subway stations, minarets and tall apartment blocks line each street.
