Today, we are going to look at punctuating direct speech.

Here are some of the rules:

1. The spoken words are shown with inverted commas on either side

2. The first spoken word begins with a capital letter.

3. The punctuation of the spoken word is recorded inside the inverted commas.

4. When there is a new speaker, start on a new line.

Let me show you

- "Toby! Where are you?" screamed Sam.
- Toby could hear his call but could not reply.
- "I have to find him," James replied. "I have to get him back."
- "Hello James," Toby just about managed to say.
