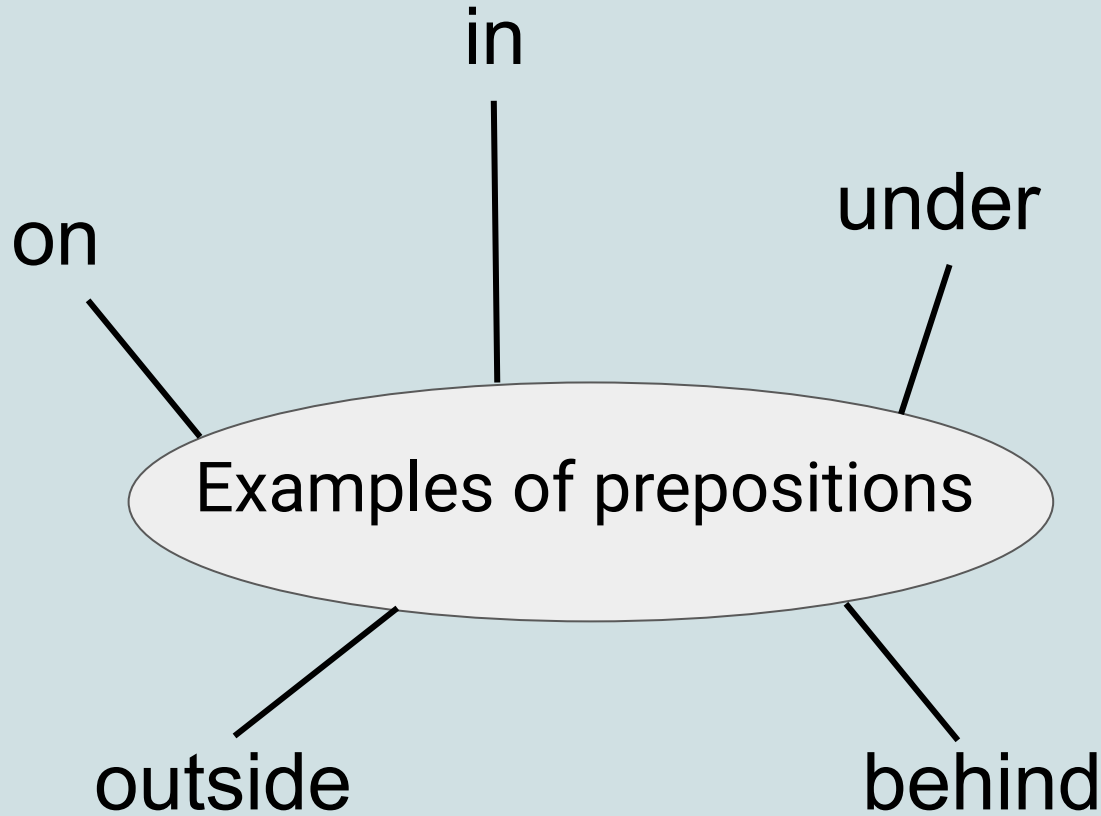

What is a preposition?

- A preposition is a word that tells you where something is in relation to something else.
- It usually connects two nouns together.

The cat is **under** the tree.

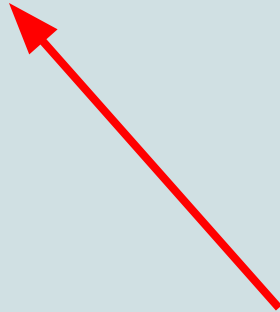

Prepositional phrases can also be used at the start of sentences.

Under the sea, fish swim happily through the coral.



Prepositional phrase - a phrase at the beginning of a sentence that tells you where something is. This is an alternative way of using prepositions.
