Answers on the next slide

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What are adverbials of time?

- Adverbials of time use words or phrases to help the reader understand when something is occurring.
- In diary writing they sequence through the day and add detail about specifically when things happened.

Remember that adverbials of time always tell us when, how long, and how often something happens.

How often: How long: When: All morning Frequently Yesterday For hours Never Today Since last week Sometimes Tomorrow Often Later Annually Last year

Let's look at some example sentences.

- Last Tuesday I walked my dog 13 miles.
- First I walked past the old play park.
- <u>After I walked past the sweet shop</u>, I crossed a busy road using the zebra crossing.
- <u>Sometimes</u> I walk into the nearby field for a change of scenery.
- <u>Since March</u> I have been careful to walk my dog in the shade.
- I walk the dog <u>before the weather is too warm.</u>
