Can I introduce an argument in a discussion text?

Introducing an argument

Here are three ways to introduce an argument:

- say whose opinion it is
- use a word/phrase to disagree with an argument
- use a word/phrase to agree with an argument

Say whose opinion it is

Start by naming the person, people or group who believe that argument:

Experts say...

Children believe...

Scientists have proven...

Adults argue...

Teachers believe...

Say whose opinion it is

Experts say that reducing your carbon footprint could save the planet.

Children believe school is a fun place: they learn exciting things and get to make friends.

Scientists have proven that school uniform has a positive impact on learning.

Adults argue that children should go to school until the age of eighteen.

Teachers believe they have the best jobs in the world.

Use a word/phrase to disagree with an argument

Most teachers believe school uniform helps pupils focus on their learning. **However**, some teachers argue that school uniform limits creativity.
